#### What is Advent?1

'Advent is a time of preparation and reflection, hope and anticipation.'2

Advent is the season when the Church prepares to celebrate the coming (in Latin - adventus) of Christ in human flesh, and also looks ahead to his final coming at the end of time.

Despite sharing the seasonal colour of purple with the season before Easter known as Lent, the characteristic note of Advent is joyful expectation, rather than penitence. The commercial pressure to pre-empt Christmas has made it hard to sustain the appropriate sense of alert watchfulness, but the fundamental Advent prayer remains 'Maranatha' – 'Our Lord, come' (1 Corinthians 16.22).

Church decorations are simple and spare, and in the northern hemisphere, the Advent season falls at the darkest time of the year, and the natural symbols of darkness and light are powerfully at work throughout Advent and Christmas.

The lighting of candles on an Advent wreath was imported into Britain from northern Europe in the nineteenth century, and is now a common practice. The Moravian custom of the Christingle has similarly enjoyed great success in Britain since the latter part of the twentieth century, with the encouragement of the Children's Society.

The Third Sunday of Advent (Gaudete or 'Rose Sunday') was observed in medieval times as a splash of colour in the restrained atmosphere of Advent, hence the pink candle in the Advent wreath.

Advent is a good time to begin or renew the habit of saying a private prayer of preparation before the service begins – perhaps the 'Collect for Purity' printed below:

#### Private Prayer of Preparation (Collect for Purity)

Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

### The Gathering

We stand at the entry of the choir and clergy during which a hymn may be sung. (Hymn numbers are shown on the hymn boards and in the pew sheet.)

#### The Advent Candle Ceremony

Each Sunday an additional candle is lit on the Advent Ring using a short ceremony to be found on the pew sheet or a separate folded sheet.

The service resumes from this point.

We meet in the name of God who is Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Amen.

#### The Greeting

The president greets the people.

The Lord be with you and also with you.

(or)

Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you and also with you.

Words of welcome or introduction may be said.



#### **Prayers of Penitence**

The deacon invites all to confess their sins in these or similar words.

Deacon When the Lord comes,

he will bring to light the things now hidden in darkness, and will disclose the purposes of the heart.

Therefore in the light of Christ let us confess our sins.

Lord Jesus, you came to gather the nations into the peace of your kingdom: Lord, have mercy.

Lord, have mercy.

You come in word and sacrament to strengthen us in holiness: Christ, have mercy.

Christ, have mercy.

You will come in glory with salvation for your people: Lord, have mercy.

Lord, have mercy.

(or)

Father eternal, giver of light and grace, we have sinned against you and against our neighbour, in what we have thought, in what we have said and done, through ignorance, through weakness, through our own deliberate fault. We have wounded your love and marred your image in us. We are sorry and ashamed, and repent of all our sins. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, who died for us. forgive us all that is past; and lead us out from darkness to walk as children of light. Amen.



#### The Absolution

The president pronounces absolution using these or similar words

May the God of love bring us back to himself, forgive us our sins, and assure us of his eternal love in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

(or)

Almighty God, who forgives all who truly repent, have mercy upon you, pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and keep you in life eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

# The Liturgy of the Word

#### The Collect

 ${\it The president reads the appropriate prayer for the week.}$ 

We sit to listen to the readings.

#### The Readings

At the end of each reading from Holy Scripture

Reader This is the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

A psalm may be read



We stand to hear the Gospel. A gradual hymn may be sung.

#### Gospel

We turn to face the Gospel party.

Gospeller Alleluia, alleluia.

Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight, and all flesh shall see the salvation of God. **Alleluia**.

Gospeller The Lord be with you and also with you.

Gospeller Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to ... Glory to you, O Lord.

At the end of the Gospel reading.

Gospeller This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

We sit to listen to the sermon.

We stand to affirm the faith of the church. (This may be omitted on weekdays.)

#### **Affirmation of Faith**

Deacon We say together in faith:

Holy, holy, holy is the Lord God almighty, who was, and is, and is to come.

Deacon We believe in God the Father, who created all things:

for by his will they were created and have their being.

Deacon We believe in God the Son, who was slain:
for with his blood,
he purchased us for God,
from every tribe and language,
from every people and nation.

Deacon We believe in God the Holy Spirit: the Spirit and the Bride say, 'Come!' Even so come, Lord Jesus! Amen.

We sit or kneel to pray.

#### **Prayers of Intercession**

In joyful expectation of his coming to our aid, let us pray to the Lord.


We are invited to respond to each petition in these or other similar words.

## The Liturgy of the Sacrament

We stand as the president introduces the peace.

#### The Peace

In the tender mercy of our God, the dayspring from on high shall break upon us, to give light to those who dwell in darkness and in the shadow of death and to guide our feet into the way of peace.

The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

Deacon Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

We share a handshake with those around us saying 'Peace be with you'.

An Offertory Hymn may be sung.

#### Preparation of the Table

The bread and wine for communion are offered with these or similar words.

As the grain once scattered in the fields and the grapes once dispersed on the hillside are now reunited on this table in bread and wine, so, Lord, may your whole Church soon be gathered together from the corners of the earth into your kingdom.

Amen.

#### The Eucharistic Prayer

The Lord be with you (or) The Lord is here.

and also with you. His Spirit is with us.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

#### From the First Sunday of Advent until 16 December

almighty God and everlasting Father, through Jesus Christ your Son.
For when he humbled himself to come among us in human flesh, he fulfilled the plan you formed before the foundation of the world to open for us the way of salvation.
Confident that your promise will be fulfilled, we now watch for the day when Christ our Lord will come again in glory.
And so we join our voices with angels and archangels and with all the company of heaven to proclaim your glory for ever praising you and *singing*:

It is indeed right and good to give you thanks and praise,

we turn to the top of page 8

#### From 17 December until Christmas Eve

It is indeed right and good to give you thanks and praise, almighty God and everlasting Father, through Jesus Christ your Son.

He is the one foretold by all the prophets, whom the Virgin Mother bore with love beyond all telling.

John the Baptist was his herald and made him known when at last he came.

In his love Christ fills us with joy as we prepare to celebrate his birth, so that when he comes again he may find us watching in prayer, our hearts filled with wonder and praise.

And so, with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we proclaim your glory, and join in their unending hymn of praise:

we turn to the top of page 8

Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.
Hosanna in the highest.

We praise and bless you, loving Father, through Jesus Christ, our Lord; and as we obey his command, send your Holy Spirit, that broken bread and wine outpoured may be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

On the night before he died he had supper with his friends and, taking bread, he praised you.

He broke the bread, gave it to them and said:

Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine.

Again he praised you, gave it to them and said:

drink this, all of you;

this is my blood of the new covenant,

which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Deacon Praise to you, Lord Jesus:

Dying you destroyed our death, Rising you restored our life: Lord Jesus, come in glory. Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day when your kingdom comes and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth.

Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with our Lady, the Blessed Virgin Mary, St George, [N] and all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.

Amen.

We sit or kneel to say the Lord's Prayer.

#### The Lord's Prayer

Awaiting his coming in glory, as our Saviour taught us, so we pray

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Lead us not into temptation
but deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power,
and the glory are yours
now and for ever. Amen.



#### **Breaking of the Bread**

Every time we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

#### Agnus Dei

Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world, have mercy on us.

Jesus, Lamb of God, have mercy on us. Jesus, bearer of our sins, have mercy on us. Jesus, redeemer of the world, grant us peace.

#### **Giving of Communion**

Draw near with faith.
Receive the body of our Lord Jesus Christ
which he gave for you,
and his blood which he shed for you.
Eat and drink in remembrance that he died for you,
and feed on him in your hearts
by faith with thanksgiving.

(or)


Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world.
Blessed are those who are called to his supper.
Lord, I am not worthy to receive you,
but only say the word, and I shall be healed.



#### The prayer of humble access

Most merciful Lord,
your love compels us to come in.
Our hands were unclean,
our hearts were unprepared;
we were not fit
even to eat the crumbs from under your table.
But you, Lord, are the God of our salvation,
and share your bread with sinners.
So cleanse and feed us
with the precious body and blood of your Son,
that he may live in us and we in him;
and that we, with the whole company of Christ,
may sit and eat in your kingdom.
Amen.

All are welcome at the altar. If for any reason you feel unable to receive the blessed bread and wine at the time of communion, please do still come forward to receive a sign of God's blessing – simply bow your head and keep your hands lowered.



#### **Prayer after Communion**

The president reads the appropriate prayer for the week.

#### The Post-Communion Prayer

Father of all, we give you thanks and praise, that when we were still far off you met us in your Son and brought us home. Dying and living, he declared your love, gave us grace, and opened the gate of glory. May we who share Christ's body live his risen life; we who drink his cup bring life to others; we whom the Spirit lights give light to the world. Keep us firm in the hope you have set before us, so we and all your children shall be free, and the whole earth live to praise your name; through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

(or)

Almighty God, we thank you for feeding us with the body and blood of your Son, Jesus Christ. Through him we offer you our souls and bodies to be a living sacrifice.

Send us out in the power of your Spirit to live and work to your praise and glory.

Amen.

When Junior Church meet, the children are invited to give feedback after which this prayer may be said by all.

Lord Jesus, we thank you for the children and young people of this parish family. Bless and guide all those who encourage them on their journey of faith, today and always. Amen

The notices and any banns of marriage are read.

We stand as the president blesses the people using these or similar words.

#### The Blessing

Christ the Sun of Righteousness shine upon you, scatter the darkness from before your path, and make you ready to meet him when he comes in glory; and the blessing of almighty God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always.

# Toddler Church

# JUNIOR CHURCH

# YOUTH CHURCH

Age 0 - 3yrs

There is a wellresourced and carpeted area at the back of the church where adults with young babies or toddlers are welcome to go during the service if they feel they need a change of scene.
This area has a speaker system so you are still able to be involved in

the service.

Age 3yrs to Year 5

Junior Church meets in the Church Hall just before 10am where they have their own session including stories, prayers, craft activities, music, etc. They come into church during communion for a blessing and sit with the leaders for the remainder of the service. They have an opportunity to share with the congregation what they have been doing.

Year 5/6 - Year 11

Youth Church starts in Church at 10.00am and then go to the Choir Vestry during the end of the first hymn. Here they have their own session with teaching, discussion, reflection, prayer, etc. They return to their families in time for communion.

All groups for children and youth are supported by at least 2 approved adults
